
Your World Council is working hard for members, exploring ways that we can help you connect with and advocate for education through art around the world.

InSEA Strategic Plan 2019-21

Note from the President

Since the current World Council took office in July 2019, I have been working closely with Councillors, the Executive Board and as many members as possible to develop a strategic plan for our period of office. World events have inevitably impacted on the plans we have made and there will need to be some flexibility in how we work towards our goals. The pandemic that is affecting all of us means that our 'normal' ways of working will have to be adapted and there and perhaps there is some advantage to looking at new ways of working together. A newsletter is not the place to present a detailed document such as a strategic plan, but I will offer some of the background context in which the plan was developed.

World Council has agreed to focus primarily on three key areas: Advocacy & Networking; Research & Praxis and Publications. Each of these dimensions has a Board with elected members, chaired by one of the Executive Board. In addition, two key working groups have been established to review the important areas of Membership and Marketing, Social Media & Protocols. Each working group is led by and comprises elected World Councillors. For more detailed information, please visit the InSEA website.

This award is available to all active InSEA member at every educational level, a single researcher, or a group collaborative are invited to participate. The deadline has been extended to November 6, 2020.

The InSEA award for Excellence in Praxis

This InSEA award is presented to an art educator or collaborative group at any level who is/are active member(s) of InSEA who has/have demonstrated a

commitment to multicultural and cross-cultural educational strategies in their schools and communities that are evident in their teaching strategies. This/these art educator(s) should have actively implemented pedagogical and curricular approaches that build respect for human dignity and diversity through art. The deadline has been extended to November 6, 2020.

Decisions will be finalized by members of the InSEA World Council. The award decision will be announced at the European Regional Congress (Jaen, Spain 2021). The recipients will be announced in the InSEA News.

In the Learning Through Art series our aim is to investigate ways in which the visual arts might help to create new ways of educating for a sustainable future. The series provides open-access publications with the help of members of the International Society for Education through Art (InSEA).

This book, the third in the series, will focus on what art educators outside universities are doing in classrooms and communities with young people aged between 3 and 18 years. As the title suggests, the book will be very visual; we invite art educators to submit images and text that describe one successful lesson, or series of lessons, that they have carried out. The emphasis is on the creativity of individual art educators and their students at whatever age, we want a picture of practice in different parts of the world. This is not intended to be a text book containing formula lessons, rather we seek critical portraits of learning, teaching and creating learning situations with visual arts.

The call is in 2 stages, stage 1 will be an outline proposal or abstract, stage 2 will involve peerreview

STAGE 1: DEADLINE 7 SEPTEMBER We invite art educators to submit a proposal (in English, but the book will also publish in the native language of authors) (max 500 words) for a contribution that includes, for example:

- o TITLE of the lesson or project
- o Photographs/ images (Minimum 2)
- o Learner characteristics including Age group
- o Country/context / location
- o Materials used
- o Timescale
- o Method/ procedure

STAGE 2: DEADLINE MONDAY 28 OCTOBER Editors will select outline proposals and invite

more detailed submission that will be reviewed. Please send your submission as. WORD file to:

NOTES: The term 'art' should be interpreted as broadly to include, for example, crafts, Indigenous making, digital, photography or time-based media.

We want art educators from around the world to share their practice and learn from each other. In order to do that please avoid terms and jargon used in particular countries, for example 'K12', 'IB', Elementary, Secondary and so on. Remember the audience of the LTA series is international

We will not accept lessons that have been based on commercial templates, publications or teachers' 'how to' books or web sites. We are not seeking academic articles on curriculum development or theory. We are interested in well documented accounts of art education practices around the world.
