If there is one thing for sure that anybody can't resist its coming as real in this contemporary era, we are to say that it is the digital phenomena. The unprecedented velocities of change and ranges of innovation initiated by digital can't be fathomed with easy. To that extent, our society has faced with gigantic wave named as digital, and it encompasses education too. Policies and agendas issued by governments, institutes or individuals in many countries are the examples. Indeed, our students have spent their entire lives from birth surrounded by and using digital gadgets as such computers, smart phones, tablet P.Cs, internet, digital music players, video cams, etc.

This means that our students are well acquainted with digital technology, but also implies that they think and learn differently. As Prensky(2001) puts this generation as 'Digital Natives', our students today are all native speakers of the digital language, and they are so different from 'Digital Immigrants' like us.

Then, what about art class? Are we safe from this grand challenge of digital natives and digital environments? The advent of digital technology has propound ramifications for art education and its practices. It is believed that a new paradigm is coming. In this juncture, dealing with the issue of digital in InSEA has not been the first nor new at all. At least for about 10 years since 2002 New York Congress, issue of digital has been dealt with in terms of media, new technologies, virtual art spaces, etc.

Nevertheless, we can't help but to admit that there is the very needs to deal with such digital issue in full gear. It is because that a full burgeoning of digital in every nook of society as well as education has been giving birth to various meanings and interpretations, possibilities and problems, hopes and anxieties which are beyond our predictions. Where the possibilities of art education and its hyper connectedness should be headed? And is it okay that we embrace such high-tech as bliss of era in art education? What problems and obstacles have been generated with the digital?

As we imagine, the digital reflects contemporary arts and art education environment savvy with high-technology. The digital possibility has de-constructed and re-constructed of ideologies in education along with massive changes. At the same time, such digital has been causing great attentions on the matter of spirituality in art education. When looking back upon its treatment of digital in art education, digital has been dealt with in terms of technology, futuristic competencies, active adaptation to rapid changes of era, etc.

But these aspects reflect the capitalistic approaches to art education on the other hand, it implies that students and competencies are seen from the perspective of capitalism's nuance. In this context, art education is apt to be dealt as a tool not purpose, a capital resources not spirituality and humanity.

With this in mind, the relationship between digital and art education is not just a matter of methodology nor technology, rather it is a matter of spirituality and humanity also. What possibilities and problems does digitally imbued art education make? What roles can art education play in better way with digital? Where can spirituality be in digital in the context of art education? With captivated by such terms as spirit, art and digital, the narratives of coexistence are defining a new zeitgeist and a key formula for survival of art education.

Daegu

Daegu Metropolitan City is located in the middle of Korea. With the fine transportation network linked in all directions, it is a point leading to numerous cultural heritages and tourist attractions to well display Korean culture. So, it has been the center of history, administration, education, and culture of Korea.

Venue

EXCO, the official congress venue for InSEA 2017, launched as the first regional exhibition and convention center in April 2001, has hosted various exhibitions and convention events.

Tip & Tax

Tipping is not a regular practice in Korea. Service charges are included in your bill for rooms, meals, and other services at hotels and upscale restaurants. Koreans occasionally do tip when they are especially pleased with the service they receive.

Value-added tax (VAT) is levied on most goods and services at a standard rate of 10% and is included in the retail price. In tourist hotels, this 10% tax applies to rooms, meals, and other services, and is included in the bill.

Local Transportation

- Taxi The fare is calculated from both the distance traveled and the time takes. Fares increase 20% between midnight and 4 a.m. Fares start from KRW 2,800. Tips are not required.
- Subway Daegu has 3 lines of metro; line 1 (red), line 2 (green) and line 3. The first train of the day starts at 5:30 AM from the departure station, and the last one at around 11:00 PM.





It is a goal for me to bring up people with a real pride to say clearly, "I am wholly responsible for meeting the challenge of the 21st century through humanities arts education". In fact, school students got sick and lost self-control due to the undernourishment in the mind. This let me to a firm decision to take up that goal. About 20-year process of repeating trial and error together with students led the birth of the world's first training procedure, which offers students vision for realizing dreams and ambitions on a global scale. This training plan was named as "Global Dream Vision Interaction (GDVI)" arts education. This Approach enables students to broaden their views on the world and people, to find their goals which constitute the nucleus of their life, and to start training toward these goals. This is the real training necessary for the very students who go forth into the world where no answer has been prepared.

GDVI is designed to heighten the level of training through 6 stages step by step. My students, Who had given credence to me, carried out the training seriously all the way. I have nothing but appreciation for their excellent cooperation. The training contained a very difficult process of thinking, judging, deciding and doing on their own. However, the students, in an attempt to get an idea of "how to live their lives", finally attained their goals by overcoming many difficulties faced in the survey research. While planning and implementing, I have had a gut feeling that any youths with ambitious never collapse. Chicago Artist Nick Cave's Community Staged Dialogues on Diversity

James H. Sanders Ⅲ
The Ohio State University, USA

James H. Sanders III, Ph. D. (Jim) is an associate professor in the Arts Administration, Education and Policy Department in the College of Arts and Sciences at The Ohio State University. Dr. Sanders is author and founding principal of the Arts-Based Elementary (North Carolina Charter) School, and has incorporated five US and international educational and cultural nonprofits. Sanders came to academe after a 26-year career in non-profit arts administration; directing four differing organizations and serving as an Arkansas Arts Council Board member (appointed by then Governor Bill Clinton).

Sanders earned a Doctorate of Philosophy (Ph.D.) degree in Education (Curriculum and Instruction) at the University of North Carolina-Greensboro (1999), a Masters of Fine Arts (MFA) degree at Southern Illinois University-Carbondale (1976), and a Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) degree from Arkansas State University (1974). His research explores a tangle of topics involving educational policy, material and visual culture, artful inquiry in the visual and performing arts, community cultural practices, and sexualities studies. Sanders was a founding trustee of the International Curriculum and Pedagogy Group, is an engaged trustee of Ohio Citizens for the Arts, and has served as an InSEA Treasurer since 2008.

Sanders recent research expressly focuses on Chicago, USA visual artist, performer and change agent, Nick Cave's community collaborations, art installations and performances, as orchestrated over the past twenty-five years—a time in which the artist and author have been professional collaborating and considering how the arts enrich lives, human understanding, and potentially lived circumstances. Sanders publications now in press consider Cave's work through Feminist, Social Reconstructionist, Critical Race and Queer theoretical lenses, and as performances exploring speculative realities, and new materialist visions. Generally Dr. Sanders research examines arts policies and practices, as sites of cultural (re)production and reception that have included (auto)biographical reflections, museum management practices, community arts organization leadership, digital media, theorizing on arts education pedagogy, and arts-based education research methods. Over the last two decades, Madeleine has developed and maintained a strategic international profile in the field of Art and Design Education, combined with very strong interdisciplinary links to Technology Enhanced Learning (TEL). These linkages, and the collaborations that they support, have enabled her to contribute to key research employing visual methodologies and creative practices – both within and outside of Art and Design Education. For example, her interdisciplinary work involving Technology Enhanced Learning and creative practices has addressed many underresearched themes, including informal learning, vocational education and social justice education. These areas of research address a significant gap and help to understand the importance of visual methods and creative practices for diverse disciplines. The UK Research Councils, notably the ESRC and EPSRC, have both extensively funded and recognised this work.

Madeleine's current research interests in Art and Design Education are built around engagement in key strategic themes, and have been developed as an internationally focused programme of research. This includes theoretical and methodological innovation, and extensive empirical findings. The work of this interdisciplinary programme of research (involving the creative practices) includes:

- The development of advanced research methodologies for investigating learning and communities
- Innovative approaches to educational and social justice interventions using advanced technologies for learning
- · Meeting economic and social needs with advanced learning technologies
- Developing communities for learning and social development with advanced technologies
- Elucidating ethical aspects of technology enhanced learning
- Developing virtual environments and creative practices to support and enhance psychological well-being

The Force of Art and the Disobedience of Learning: Building a Life

Dennis Atkinson Gold Smith University, UK

Dennis Atkinson is Professor Emeritus at Goldsmiths University of London, Department of Educational Studies and the Centre for the Arts and Learning. Rita L. Irwin is a Professor of Art Education and Curriculum Studies at the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, BC, Canada. Rita received her formal education at the University of Lethbridge (B. Ed. and Diploma), the University of Victoria (M.Ed.) and the University of British Columbia (Ed.D.). Rita has been an educational leader for a number of provincial, national and international organizations including being President of the *Canadian Society for the Study of Education, Canadian Association of Curriculum Studies, Canadian Society for Education through Art, International Society for Education through Art and Chair of the World Alliance for Arts Education.* Her research interests have spanned in-service art education, teacher education, socio-cultural issues, and curriculum practices across K-12 and informal learning settings. Rita publishes widely, exhibits her artworks, and has secured a range of research grants, including a number of *Social Science and Humanities Research Council of Canada* grants to support her work in Canada, Australia, Africa and Taiwan.

Training Art Museum Educators in China

Yingshi Yang
National Art Museum of China (NAMOC), China

Dr. Yang Yingshi is Deputy Director of the Public Education Department of the National Art Museum of China (NAMOC) in Beijing. He is also Deputy Director and Secretary-general of the Public Education Experts Committee of NAMOC, which consists of leading scholars and practitioners from all over the world.

He is the first returned Chinese scholar who graduated with a doctorate for his research in arts administration and art museum education from a leading American university. He obtained a Master's degree in Arts in Education from Harvard University and a Doctor's degree in Art and Art Education from Columbia University. Currently he teaches a graduate course in Art Museum Education Research and Practice at the Central Academy of Fine Arts (CAFA) and advises Master's degree students in art museum education at CAFA. He also teaches a graduate course in Arts and Cultural Administration and an undergraduate course in Art Curatorial Studies at the School of the Arts, Peking University.

In addition, he is a guest professor of the Central Academy of Cultural Administration and the academic host of the National Training Program for Art Museum Educators, as well as a committee member of the social education committees of both the Chinese Museums Association and the Beijing Museums Society. He served as a member of the National Advisory Committee on Public Cultural Services of Chinese Ministry of Culture and was the secretary-general of the Youth Committee of the Western Returned Scholars Association US Branch. He was a visiting fellow of the University of Hawaii at Manoa in Honolulu and the Asia Society in New York. Dr. Yang is the author of numerous publications including *Art Museums as Educational Institutions: A Case Study of Four Museums in New York City with Implications for China*. He has also been the initiator and organizer of many national and international projects, among them Art Space for Education's Sake: China-US Conference on Art Museum Education (2008) and National Annual Conference on Art Museum Public Education since 2015. He was a recipient of research fellowships from foundations such as the Asian Cultural Council and the Getty Foundation in the US.

Arts can be understood by not only vision but also tactile, hearing, smelling, tasting perception. Also, everyone has the equal right to enjoy the pleasure of appreciation and creation. So children and adults with visually impairments or blindness should be educated through arts to communicate with people, events, and the environment surrounding them.

In the first part of this workshop, participants will understand the development of art education for the blind in Taiwan. Then, the organizer will give a brief introduction of audio description, and the cases of how artists without vision to create arts. Next, participants will learn how to interpret an image and visual information for blind people via descriptive video service, then being blindfolded to draw after touching tactile pictures and 3D objects. All participants will be distributed in a small group to practice recognizing images and drawing pictures by touching and hearing.

After this workshop, all participants can share their blindfolded experiences and feelings without sight. Non-visual arts not only design for blind persons, but also for the sighted. So, teachers can transfer creating experience in the dark to figure out multi-sensory art courses for students, and the skill of audio description also assists students to create imagination without visual perception.

The workshop with ten short drawing tasks aimed at raising the motivation (self-efficacy beliefs construct) of participants and to improve their drawing skills, although in a very short period of

46 - 60 minutes. Actually, the participants will simulate one of the life-long learning drawing and motivating strategies that author uses in his in-service training of elementary teachers of art in Slovenia in the period of last 13 years.

The underlying theoretical construct of this workshop is based on the motivational concept of self-efficacy beliefs, originated by Albert Bandura. Art education advisers, teacher trainers and teachers themselves may find this approach as challenging for their work in art teaching, and can adapt it into their learning situations and age of students. Art education students may find this workshop as a motivation for their further art pedagogy studies.

Participants will be firstly given 10 sheets of A4 size paper and a pencil, softness B2 - B6, will secondly realize drawings according to his instructions. The educational purpose of the task will not be revealed at the beginning but at the final evaluation, based on the drawing collections of participant volunteers.



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


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
